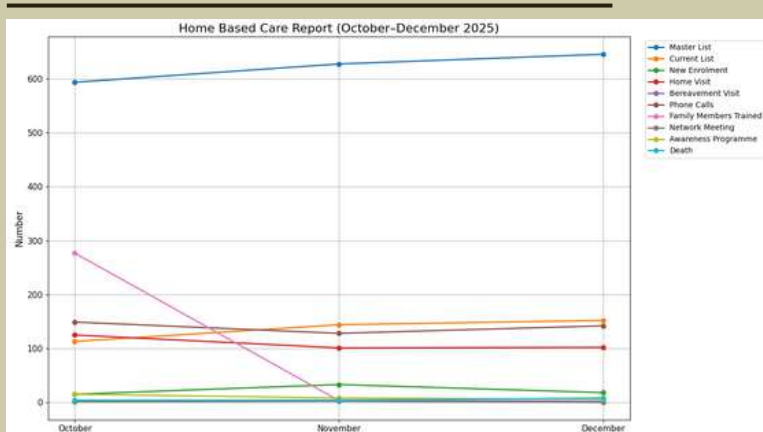
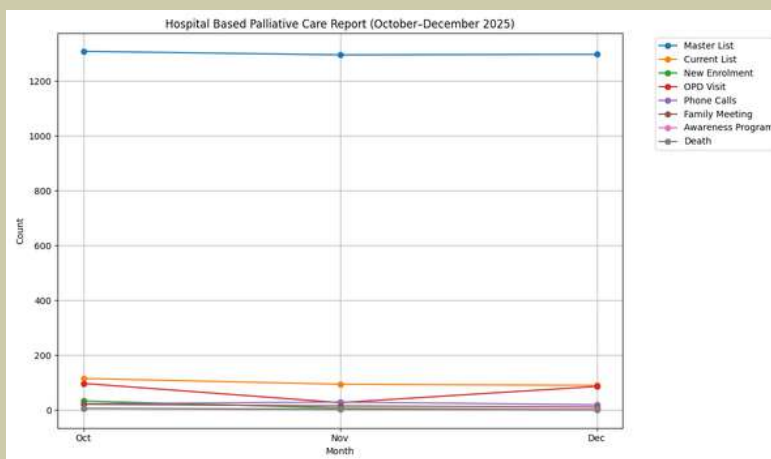


2025 October to December Report



Between October and December 2025, the home-based palliative care programme demonstrated steady growth, with the Master List increasing from 594 to 646 and the Current List from 113 to 152 patients. Home visits and phone calls remained consistently high, ensuring regular patient support. New enrolments peaked at 33 in November before declining to 18 in December. Although family training, awareness programmes, and network meetings varied, the quarter reflected sustained service delivery and expanding patient coverage.



The Hospital-Based Palliative Care programme maintained consistent patient care activities from October to December 2025. While the Master List remained stable at over 1,290 patients, the Current List declined from 115 to 90. New enrolments decreased significantly, and OPD visits fluctuated during the quarter. Phone calls remained an important follow-up activity, while family meetings and awareness programmes gradually declined. Deaths also reduced, with no deaths reported in December.

A three-day Training for Trainers Programme on Palliative Care was organised by Baptist Christian Hospital in collaboration with the Indian Association of Palliative Care, with support from Rotary Greater Tezpur and Sergio Remedies Pvt. Ltd. Held from 6–8 November 2025, the programme trained 20 participants on key areas such as pain management, communication, psychological issues, home care, spirituality, care of the dying, grief and bereavement, and the role of caregivers and social workers. The sessions were made engaging through activities, role plays and short videos that highlighted teamwork, empathy and positive attitudes. One notable activity using balloons emphasised collective effort and mutual support. A separate one-day training for doctors on 8 November covered specialised topics including breaking bad news, goals of care, paediatric palliative care, ICU ethics and spiritual support. The programme concluded with certificate distribution and expressions of gratitude to the facilitators, organisers, donors and participants for their meaningful contribution.
